Why did the Newsletter Change?

You probably have noticed that the format of the newsletter this month has changed. The old newsletters were printed on 11 x 17 paper double sided and then folded into a 8 ½ x 11 format and mailed flat. The new postal regulations and pricing that went into effect this spring have radically changed the cost of the newsletter mailing. The cost to mail the newsletter last month was 97 cents per copy. This is an increase from the 63 cents it cost at the start of the year.

We were told that the cost could be reduced to 53 cents if we folded the newsletter as you see it this month. There is another issue in that the thickness needs to be kept down as well. If we were to print the newsletter on the same 11 x 17 paper that we have been using for years, and then folded it a second time to make sure it fit in the smaller size, some of them would probably be too thick to mail at the 53 cent rate.

Because of these changes, we have gone to printing the newsletter on 8 ½ x 11 paper, stapling the newsletter in the upper left corner, folding it and then closing it like you see it here. This reduces the production cost of the newsletter, adds quite a bit more flexibility (we can change the size of the newsletter by 2 pages at a time rather than 4 pages). We can print the newsletter on a wider variety of printers (very few printers can print on 11x 17 paper double sided.) It will also be easier to print pages with color on them. Members can also print extra copies at home on standard printers.

The disadvantage of this approach is that the newsletter will not look as professional when printed this way. If you need copies which are going to be on public display, let me know in advance and I will try to print them in the old format. Please let me know if you have trouble opening your newsletter this month.

It would not surprise me if we change the format or mailing process a couple more times before we get it stabilized again.

Please let me or the Board of Directors know how you feel about the changes.



Did you know that you can get your newsletter electronically each month?

Or did you expect to get a copy electronically and still received a paper copy?

Just send us a note or check the box on your membership Application. You will get a notice each month when the newsletter is available on the website.

Make sure you include your email address. At least one member who requested an electronic copy did not include the email address on the membership application.

FuelCostCalculator.com

Planning to drive to your vacation destination? Wondering if it would be cheaper to fly? This site keeps tabs on fuel costs in various regions of the country.

You tell it where you're starting, where you're going, and what kind of car you'll be driving. It calculates your expected gas mileage times the number of miles you're going, times the cost of fuel. The result is displayed in an easy-to-read chart. Very cool!

AZUnclaimed.gov

Every year the state of Arizona accumulates money that has not been claimed by its rightful owners. It might be from bank accounts that have gone inactive, or escrow balances or insurance policies or even the contents of safe deposit boxes.

This site works in conjunction with the national site, MissingMoney.com which will search the whole US. Just enter your name and see if there's any money waiting for you!

GAMES AND ENTERTAINMENT

WillItBlend.com

Blendtec, makers of the Total Blender, found a unique way to advertise. These short videos show Tom Dickson, resplendent in his lab coat and safety goggles, blending, well ... things.

There are two categories of videos: "Try this at home" and "DON'T try this at home". Naturally, the latter is the funnier! Watch Tom blend a bag

of marbles, golf balls, glow sticks, even an iPhone! But please, Don't Try This At Home!

ChowDownPhoenix.com

Hungry? Don't know what you want? C'mon over to this site and see a listing of local restaurants by location, menu, rating, cost, whatever you need to know! You can even add comments to a review if you agree (or disagree!) strongly. Before you go out to eat, go out to this site!

JigZone.com

Solve online jigsaw puzzles in a variety of styles. Upload your own pictures to be turned into jigsaw puzzles. Embed jigsaw puzzles into your website. Amuse your friends by sharing jigsaw puzzles with them. Annoy your enemies by sharing HARD jigsaw puzzles with them!

Cubis 2.com (<http://cbsgames.com/games/play/cubis/play>)

Don't know why it's Cubis 2 - presumably there's a Cubis 1 out there somewhere. To play you line up colored cubes to make three of a color in a row. Rows can be horizontal or vertical. When you get three in a row they are removed, dropping any above them into place. If that causes another sequence of 3 in a row, that's Cubis! You get extra points for that.

IMDB.com

IMDB is short for Internet Movie DataBase. But it isn't limited to movies. There is TV show information in there, too. You can search by Title, Actor/Actress, Character's name, year, Director, and more. Everyone who played in a movie or TV show will be listed. If you click his/her name you'll get a listing of everything else he/she has ever been in!

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Well, maybe not commercials, but movies or TV shows, at least.

wwiTV.com

Choose from a list of online TV stations broadcast around the world. See stations from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe (but not in the US).

Choose a country and you'll get a list of stations with a brief description of their programming. Click a channel and see what's happening around the world.

MovieMistakes.com

Remember the TV show Cheers? Well in one episode a piano player (played by John Mahoney) comes into the bar. Cut to the TV show Frasier, based on Kelsey Grammer's character in Cheers. In Frasier, John Mahoney plays Frasier's dad, but he doesn't play the piano. This is the kind of thing some people notice, and then they post it on MovieMistakes.com

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Phy.org

Where was this site when I was in Physics class? Here you can learn more than you even knew existed about Physics and the Physical World, Impress your friends! Amaze your enemies! Convince your inlaws that you're really, really smart!

This site will answer all your questions, and do it in a variety of languages. It's incredible!

TalkOrigins.org

This site is not about the origin of talk; it's talk about the origins of everything else. There was some trepidation about visiting this site, with the expectation of "flame wars". But many of the

discussions are rational, well-researched, thought-provoking pieces.

Whichever side of the debate you're on, you'll find information here you won't find elsewhere.

MarsToday.com

Watch the progress of the rovers working on the Red Planet. Check out the weather on Mars. (You'll feel better about Phoenix!) See remarkably cool pictures of the surface of Mars from its orbiting satellite.

You'll be fascinated by the wealth of information this site provides.

SlashDot.com

News for Nerds and stuff that matters. You can keep up-to-date on the workings of the computer world by checking in here regularly. There are polls, stories, events, and news all related to computers and IT.

The name of the site came from the mind of its owner who wanted a name that would be easy to remember, but difficult to tell someone. Hence: "slash dot dot com"

FinePrint.com

Free trial versions of software you can use to create your own .pdf files. You can combine documents to make a single .pdf, secure them, embed fonts - all the tools are there. Also listed on this page, and giving it its name, is a program called Fine Print.

Using it you can print multiple pages of a file on a single sheet, create and print watermarks, and save files to picture formats like jpg or tif.

Websites 4 U: Scrabulous.com

Like Scrabble? This month's site is just for you. It is called Scrabulous.com - Online Scrabble for you and your friends.

There is no fee to play on the site. You do need to register. I have only gotten game reports from them and a couple of emails checking that my account is working. If you are worried about giving them your real address, set up a Gmail or other throw away account to handle the mail. Just don't forget to check that address if you play by email.

This site doesn't just let you play live Scrabble online. It also lets you play a number of variations, such as email Scrabble, and Scrabble on FaceBook. In the live Scrabble areas, you can play against other members, the computer or by yourself. The games work just as they do on your regular board, with squares that multiply individual letters and entire words. You get a rack of letters and you try to make words.

For those who are dedicated Scrabble players, you can play timed games in any mode or untimed games in any mode. You also have the choice of whether to play with the SOWPODS dictionary, which is the one used internationally, or the TWL dictionary, which is what is commonly used in North America.

In addition to those normal variations, the site also has what is called Strategy Scrabble. In this variation, you can see your opponent's tiles and they can see yours. Makes it very interesting, as you are given the option to set up moves that will purposely block the other player's best words.

Ok - good enough. Addicting. Enjoyable. Useful. But, this site also has a number of dictionaries to

it. There are the two letter dictionaries for each of the main dictionaries. There are search functions to verify whether you are spelling a word correctly. There are even downloadable versions of each of the two dictionaries. Downloading the dictionaries gives you a text file you can search for words using your letters

Tj and I have played the games on the site and found them to be quite addicting. We hope you find them as enjoyable as we did!

Additional website note: Bruce noticed the other day that you don't need to be invited to Gmail anymore. If you go to www.gmail.com, you can check to see if an email handle is available. If it is, you can claim it and set up an account. If it isn't, you can check other names until you find one. The system will also suggest names for you. ψ



Domain names and Phishing

Phishing is the process of getting users to think they are going to a website they know and trust and instead sending the user to a different website. The purpose of this article is to describe a little bit about how they do this. I will discuss a little bit about how links on internet work. This should help you to spot phishing links so you are better protected from them.

When you are reading a website and see a link like <http://www.banksecond.com/> you may be tempted to click on the link to follow it. On the face of it, this link would take me to my bank's website: www.banksecond.com. But instead it would take me to www.phisherbank.com



When you put the mouse over the top of the link you will see that even though the text says [www.bank second.com](http://www.banksecond.com) the link is to www.phisherbank.com.

This is done by taking advantage of the feature in browsers that was designed to help make a web pages more readable. If you have used the web for any length of time you have seen links that say something like "for more information click [here](#)." Of course, "here" is not the location of the web site you are going to be sent to when you click on the word.

This is possible because a link has two parts. The displayed part (in this case "here"), and the destination. The destination can be anything I want. The user can't tell where they are going to go when they click on the link unless they either look at the HTML code of the website or float over the top of the link like I have in this screen shot.

What I did in my example was to replace the word "here" with text that *looks* like a link to banksecond. Because we're so used to seeing links in that format, a person just assumes that they will be sent to that location when they click on it.

Now lets look at what can be done with the destination part of the link.

OK, where does the following link take me?

www.banksecond.com.phisherbank.cn/info.html

What this link takes you to is a computer named www at phisherbank.cn. If everything else was legitimate (yeah, right) this computer is located in China. Bank Second has nothing to do with this computer and no control over it. A little explanation of the inner workings of the web are in order here so that you can understand why this type of confusion as possible.

When I go to a domain registrar and register the name phisherbank.cn, what does that actually mean? All it really means is that I have bought the right to build a table of the address of all computers in the phisherbank.cn domain. The original purpose of these tables was to allow system administrators to add computers to their network without having to get permission from someone on the Internet as a whole. Don't worry too much right off the start about understanding this. I will explain this table in a moment.

Here is an oversimplified representation of a table that could be built.

10.25.13.12	phisherbank.cn
10.25.13.10	www.phisherbank.cn
10.25.13.22	mail.phisherbank.cn
10.30.12.10	com.phisherbank.cn
10.30.12.12	banksecond.com.phisherbank.cn
10.30.12.13	www.banksecond.com.phisherbank.cn

The first line here traditionally would say that Phisher bank's main computer to the outside

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world can be found at 10.25.13.12. This number, 10.25.13.12, is called an IP address and is the real basis for how computers talk to each other across the internet. Phisher bank also has another computer called www (probably a web server) which is located at 10.25.13.10 and a mail server at 10.25.13.22.

They also have a department called com. In the com department there's a sub-department called banksecond. In that sub-department there is another computer called www. This computer is the server they want to send people to so that they can steal their identities. In real life this can all be done on a single computer.

Now when given a URL like:
www.banksecond.com.phisherbank.cn/info.htm

The browser looks through the URL until it comes to the end of the computer designation part of the URL. In this particular case it's the / right before the info.htm. The "cn" tells the browser that this is a computer located in China. The browser then goes to the registrar for cn websites and asks it where the table for phisherbank is.

Based on this information the browser asks for the address of the www computer located in the sub-department banksecond in the department com. It is given the address of 10.30.12.13. Finally, it asks for the file info.htm. It displays or does whatever the file says to do. Ouch!

Now of course Phisherbank is not a real company. What they want to be able to do is build up a link that looks like a link to banksecond.com that actually gets you connected to a computer that they control. This computer has a website that looks as much like banksecond's website as possible.

Also be aware that the URL they put in the phishing message will be quite a bit more complicated than the simple one I've shown here. They are likely to put underscores, percent signs, question marks and other fun things so that the

phisherbank.cn part of the URL is quite a ways away from the start so it's harder to see.

Other Issues

A couple of other things to be concerned about, scammers sometimes buy domain names that are very close to the domain names of popular legitimate companies. This is called typo squatting. For instance if banksecond was a very popular and heavily used bank, the scammer would be tempted to register banksceond.com. Notice that we have swapped the order of two letters.

If 10,000 people every day type in banksecond.com. A few of them every day will go to the scammer's website instead of the correct one.

Usually these sites make their money off of advertising instead of trying to drain people's bank accounts but there is still a threat.

One more thing that is coming up is multi language characters. Not all browsers will correctly handle domain names which have characters from non English character sets. For example, if I register the domain name bankseond.com you can see that the character "σ" looks very much like an "o". There are concerns that when this is approved and these characters are allowed more sophisticated phishing will occur.

Note: the domain names in this article are made up. No relation to actual domains or organizations is intended.

REFERENCE SOURCES

WikiMindMap.com

If you're familiar with the site Wikipedia.com, then you're familiar with how easy it is to get lost in the information. Enter Wiki Mind Map, a site that sets your search term into the center of the Wiki-World and shows links from it to related information. Many of those links have related links of their own, and soon the map leads you right to what you need!

Remember that Wikipedia is populated with information from anyone on the web, so check other sources, too.

Dictionary.com

This site is a triple threat! A dictionary, a thesaurus, and an encyclopedia online, together for your convenience. Click the appropriate tab at the top, enter your search term, and go for it. Information at your fingertips! Who needs Ken Jennings?

Global.Dymo.com

So you're typing a letter in Word, Word Perfect, Open Office or whatever and you want to send it to a certain person but you don't remember the complete address. If you have downloaded this little tool, it will help you find the info! Including the Zip +4! Now that's service!

RSES.org

If you want a job that will never go out of style in Phoenix, you want to work in HVAC! This site is all about the national training authority for HVAC

personnel. You can also visit the local training site: **CAZRSES.org**

Soon you'll be so busy fixing everybody else's A/C you'll forget about your own!

www.siteadvisor.com

You've just gotten an e-mail from a friend about a cool new freeware or shareware program from an unfamiliar website name, and are eager to try it out, but

How can you feel a little bit safer about the host offering the download, or the file itself? Now you can vet the site, and the download at www.siteadvisor.com, run by the folks at MacAfee.

They employ a server that, in essence 'pretends' to be a user, signing up for free downloads, visiting sites, and the server analyzes what comes back from each query; how much spam comes back, what the downloaded files do to your computer, if installed, etc.

Think of it as a 'reputation validating' service. You can learn very quickly if a destination or download is something you want to avoid, and that, after all is information we all value! Oh, and you can contribute! Nominate sites you visit that have not yet been checked by siteadvisor's server. All the details are on the page, at www.siteadvisor.com. There is also an add-on for Firefox that will 'rate' all your Google searches

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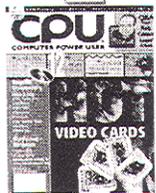
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14th Annual Southwest User Group Conference in San Diego CA
